

FAREWELL MRS ANNE PITOS

Anne commenced the Iona chapter of her life with her appointment as Deputy Principal (Administration) in 1994. This complex role saw Anne in charge of the pastoral structure of the College, the Co-curricular program, events management, and overseeing the Boarding House, all tasks that she carried out with dignity, efficiency and sensitivity. Anne also made a significant input into curricular matters, including the preparation of examination timetables and rosters, and the College timetable itself.

It was no surprise when, in 2000, Anne was appointed as Principal of Santa Maria College. The move was felt acutely at Iona, and Anne's return as Principal of Iona in 2009 was met with wide acclaim in the College community.

Anne brought great wisdom and vision to her new appointment, at a school where her own daughters, Jacinta and Chloe, had spent most of their schooling and which was very dear to Anne's heart. Building on the successful structures already existing at Iona, to many of which Anne herself had contributed in her years as Deputy Principal, Anne sought immediately to put Iona at the front of educational methodology, especially in the area of technology, where Anne implemented a one-to-one computer program for both staff and students, a vital plank in advancing online learning.

Anne revamped the House system, introducing two new houses and making students' House identity a more vital part of the school structure. To this end, House Coordinators were appointed and Mr Rod O'Meara became their director. Homeroom classes were also organised according to House, so that students formed a strong relationship with their fellow House members and those of other year groups.

Anne maintained a close eye on the curriculum, assuring that Iona was always at the cutting edge of new developments and new technologies. Along with the changes introduced statewide in the senior years of schooling, Anne ensured that the College's Access Learning pathway, for students seeking a practical, hands-on style of learning, provided excellent opportunities for the attainment of TAFE Certificates as a requirement for graduation. In fact, Iona's level of achievement of graduation for both the ATAR and Access Learning pathways has been extremely high – 100% in most years.

The process of change to the College winter uniform, began in Anne's time as Deputy Principal, was carried through to its conclusion, with the beautiful present-day navy blue outfit, which harks back to the original pre-1950 Iona uniform, a very popular change.

On an organisational scale, Anne has updated the staff structure in the College, creating new positions in middle management and senior management. In part, this has been necessitated by the amalgamation of the Junior School and Senior School as a united College under one Principal. The present-day structure includes a Deputy Principal and Heads of Junior School and Senior School, reflecting the two-campus model. At the same time, Anne has extended the capacity of the Junior

School to enrol boys up to Year 6 and now includes children as young as three years of age in the Pre-Kindergarten program. The sense of a single, united staff, with several opportunities for combined events between Junior and Senior School, has strengthened the sense of mission and purpose at the College.

Anne has always kept a keen eye on the facilities on both campuses, ensuring our students have the best possible opportunities to learn in a stimulating environment. To this end, the marvellous Nature Play development at the Junior School and the magnificent New Learning Centre on the Senior Campus are testimony to Anne's vision and her determination to position Iona as a school with an outstanding future. College enrolments are at the



highest they have ever been and the diversity of curricular and Co-curricular pursuits available at both campuses ensures that Iona's position in Western Australian education is secure.

The closing of the Boarding House has been a significant change in the College's history, and once again involved a process that was carried out with dignity and sensitivity. The option of having Iona students board at St Hilda's has been a master stroke, allowing the possibility of an Iona education for those families who could not otherwise provide this, and maintaining a wonderful historical link with the generations of boarders who have been a vital part of this school since it opened in 1908.

Anne must especially be commended for her strong focus on maintaining the College's Presentation ethos. With almost no Presentation Sisters now taking an active role in the College, the importance of lay staff articulating the mission of Nano Nagle and the Presentation heritage of this 113-year-old school has never been more imperative. Under Anne's leadership, this vital component of the school's essential purpose has been strengthened and elevated. The transfer of the College in 2017 from the Presentation Sisters to Catholic Education WA has

encouraged a renewed sense of the importance of tradition in the College and Anne has ensured that Iona will always be a Presentation School. Our participation in the Nagle Education Alliance of Australia, of which Anne has been a strong and active supporter, will be an important ingredient in retaining the school's Presentation soul.

On top of all her marvellous achievements, and the splendid legacy of buildings and learning structures, Anne will always be remembered for encouraging Iona's students to be strong women of leadership, ready to go out into society and make a difference for good. This is the 21st Century equivalent to Nano Nagle's education imperative for the Catholic poor of Ireland, and is well captured in Anne's oft-repeated cry that Iona students are "can do" women. In every aspect of Anne's superlative leadership of Iona, she has shown us that she herself is most certainly a "can do" woman. The Nagle family motto, *Non vox sed votum*, loosely translated as "Deeds, Not Words", rings very true for this wonderful Principal, who has been an inspiration for a generation of staff and students and their families. And, although it's "farewell" for now, Anne, your presence at Iona will be seen and felt for generations to come.

I was able to explore these desires and while doing so feel nurtured and supported by my community of peers and teachers. After completing Clothing Production and Fashion & Textile Design at TAFE, I've pushed forward with my business and haven't stopped since. There have been many iterations of the business you see today. If you would compare my work from then to what you see today you can see how far I've come in defining my artistic style and that came from constantly reinventing myself and only making what made me happy.

Today I create art, illustrations, branding, commissions and also have an online store where I release Giclee

Art Prints, Linen Wall Hangings, Printed Pillows and so much more. Each item is carefully crafted within Australia- something that was important to me. I produce all my textile-based products in my Brisbane home studio and this made-to-order model means I use less resources, eliminate overproduction all while sustaining my business and creating what feels good and is good for our environment.

My consideration for the environment has always been a priority to me and something I know will stay with me as my art continues to evolve. Right now, that looks like creating original paintings, commissioned artwork and collaborating with like-minded artists.

Community, especially this year has been a value I've come to learn so much from. Since co-founding an online gallery in March of this year, called Together Gallery. The name really speaks for the intention of the project- a place where we can come together in difficult times, create art and uplift each other. This year has been difficult for so many, and the gallery has been a great teacher for me in how we can all help each other by sharing our talents generously.

Iona and the Presentation Sisters are an especially important part of our lives. This is the collective story of our three generations.




With every 'new beginning', with all the changes and challenges we have faced, we continue to draw on the strengths

As a student at Iona, I never thought of myself as someone who would be doing 'big things'. I always imagined myself living a nice quiet life close to my family in Perth. But life has a way of challenging you to do things you never dreamed you would be doing.

Looking back over the last 20 years or so, my life has been a series of big changes and new beginnings.

In 2003, armed with a brand-new PhD, I set off for the US with only a suitcase in tow, ready to start work as a postdoctoral scientist at the National Institutes of Health. I had planned to only be away for a couple of years, but it wasn't until 2016, after moving continents a second time, that I finally moved back to Australia, this time with a 40ft container, a husband and two little Australian-German-Hungarians.

2020 has given me some time for reflection, and it's interesting to look back at the path I've taken in becoming the person I am today. I've been lucky to have been able to follow opportunities that captured my interests and passions, no matter if they were difficult or scary, and sometimes a bit crazy and I think I have my family to thank for this.

My family always encouraged me to believe I could do whatever I wanted. And when I think back about my time at Iona, aside from a great education, I think the greatest thing I learnt that has helped me on this path was resilience (and, of course, the second verse of the National Anthem).

This year has been a year of extremes. In Canberra where I reside, we've been rocked by bushfires, smoke, hailstorms and of course, the global pandemic.

After many new beginnings, right now, I'm really looking forward to the next chapter, which will hopefully be a bit less chaotic.

Thankfully, as the fog of COVID-19 slowly lifted, we were able to coordinate a very successful breakfast, hosted by Larissa Strk at the Supreme Court of WA.

The theme of Social Justice and the diversity in experience of our three panellists, Julie Sprigg, Kirsten Trott & Melissa Edwards enticed a full room of Ionians to attend, all with a united goal. To meet and reconnect with Ionians, be inspired by the stories of others, share their own experiences and have a laugh and a chat.

Read our hosts and panellists bios below:

LARISSA STRK (Class of 1992)

Larissa Strk spent five years of her senior school education at Iona from 1988 to 1992. Following her graduation in 1992, Larissa went on to study Law at UWA. Her study then led her to a successful career as a lawyer with international law firm King & Wood Mallesons, where she went on to become a Partner.

In 2016, Larissa joined the Supreme Court of Western Australia as the Principal Registrar, where, for a cumulative period of approximately six months, she concurrently performed the role of Principal Registrar and of Acting Master. From November 2018 to June 2019, Larissa was appointed as an Acting Supreme Court Justice.

As an active member of her community, Larissa's Presentation Education reins true- giving back when and where she can. Settling opinions as a member of the KWM Judicial Review Asylum Seeker Project team, hosting numerous events and volunteering her time to raise awareness for a range of charities, Larissa

has also been a regular participant in the Vinnies CEO Sleep-out, raising funds and awareness for homelessness.

More recently, Larissa has collaborated with staff at Iona to implement a Work Experience program for Iona students interested in a career in Law (see page 25).



KIRSTEN TROTT (Class of 1992)

Kirsten's career has spanned Perth, Melbourne, London and Singapore. Her varied roles have included working as a Solicitor, promoting the rule of law in North East Asia, heading up strategy for a public policy think tank, designing compliance monitoring for the Australian Code of Banking Practice, and working in operational risk and financial crime compliance in an international bank.

In London, Kirsten first discovered her professional passion for whistleblowing. Working with leading UK charity Public Concern at Work (now Protect), Kirsten commenced giving legal and practical advice to whistleblowers, advising on global whistleblowing law and policy reforms and assisting organisations to embed open, ethical and accountable workplace structures and cultures. She returned to that work in 2016 in Singapore leading the design and implementation of Standard Chartered Bank's global whistleblowing strategy across 63 different countries.

Last year she returned to Perth after 20 years away and founded Moken Consulting which specialises in whistleblowing advisory work. She took on the role of Head of Compliance for HBF in July of this year.

Kirsten has a law degree from UWA, a post graduate diploma in International Community Development from the University of Queensland and a double Masters in Law and in Public Policy from the National University of Singapore.





JULIE SPRIGG

(Class of 1993)

After graduating from Iona in 1993

Julie studied Physiotherapy at Curtin University. Julie worked as a physiotherapist for ten years in WA and the UK before setting off to live and work in Ethiopia for two years.

Her recently published book, 'Small Steps: A Physio in Ethiopia' was shortlisted for the 2018 T.A.G Hungerford award, and tells the stories of the children with disabilities that Julie worked with, woven together with her experience of teaching in Ethiopia's first Physiotherapy degree.

On returning to Australia in 2007, Julie joined international development organisation CBM Australia, and worked with human rights and community empowerment programs for people with disabilities in India, China, Cambodia, Vietnam and Bangladesh. Julie then worked for Save the Children, as a disability inclusion advisor in education and health programs across Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Philippines, Vietnam and Vanuatu.

Julie now works for the WA state government, advising on evaluation for programs to overcome social disadvantage. While in this role Julie has been privileged to meet with community members in remote Aboriginal communities for discussions about government programs and social issues.

Julie's career has been driven by an awareness of global and domestic inequalities, and she credits her Presentation education with nurturing a social conscience from a very young age.



MELISSA EDWARDS

(Class of 1989)

After graduating from Iona in 1989, Melissa

completed a Bachelor of Arts and a Post Graduate Diploma in Aboriginal and Intercultural studies. After marrying Scott in 1996 and having their first daughter Ruby (Class of 2016), Melissa completed a Bachelor of Social Work.

Melissa has worked as a Social Worker in the health and hospital setting for the past 16 years with 2nd daughter Ava arriving during this time (currently Yr 7 at Iona).

Melissa now holds the position of Head of Department for Social Work for Fiona Stanley and Fremantle Hospitals, leading the Social Work, Aboriginal Hospital Liaison and Pastoral Care Teams.

Since 2015, Melissa has been a voluntary Board Member of the Fremantle Women's Health Centre.

In her professional and voluntary role, Melissa is acutely aware of the social determinates of health and wellbeing. Together with her colleagues, Melissa strives to reduce barriers and improve access for all.


Two Year 7s set new records; Madison Naish for hurdles and Ava Fraser-Edwards for shotput.

PRESENTATION WOMEN

Iona Presentation College has a rich-history, dating back to 1907 when the College was established by the Presentation Sisters. With this rich history comes a significant story, a story that has now been brought to life in the form of an eighty-square-metre mural in the heart of the Campus.

The mural is part of the Presentation Reflection Walk, designed to highlight and celebrate the College's heritage and to represent the story of Nano Nagle, the Presentation Sisters and the Iona community.

"We wanted to bring Iona's story to life in a way that would capture people's attention," said Anne Pitos, Principal at Iona Presentation College.

"The mural is bold, bright and captures the colours, the people and the places relevant to the history of Iona Presentation College."

Mikaela Miller, the artist commissioned to create the mural, is an emerging artist and designer based in Fremantle. Over the past 12 months, her creative process has involved interviewing senior staff, students, Presentation Sisters and community members to develop an understanding of the College's history and how that history relates to people today.

"What struck me was how strongly students value the history of the College and there is a strong connection to the legacy of Nano Nagle and the Presentation Sisters. Students feel connected to these women through history," Mikaela explained. With a passion for the natural world, Mikaela has used her love and knowledge of flowers to highlight the geographical journey of Iona; moving from Ireland to Geraldton and finally to the banks of the Swan River in Mosman Park.

When preparing her 'canvas,' or in this case an 80sqm wall, Mikaela used a floral grid system which in itself looks like a beautiful work of art.

She explained that rather than using the standard grid system to get the proportions of her work right, she likes to freestyle with a floral grid, especially when creating portraiture.

"I don't generally call myself a portrait artist but sometimes the right story calls for it, and when it does the squiggle grid can be a great method to get my proportions right," Mikaela explained.

“I had a few staff and students baffled when I started my squiggle grid at the beginning of the process.” Situated in Cove Lane, a vibrant outdoor space where students can work together in a more relaxed setting, the artwork adds to the inner-city style laneway vibe. The Lane also acts as a reminder of Nano Nagle’s vocation through the laneways of Cork, another nod to the meaningful history behind the College.

Having Mikaela on campus, creating her art in front of the students, has been incredibly rewarding for those interested in production arts.

Over four weeks of installation, students have had the opportunity to chat with Mikaela, watch her work and enjoy seeing a professional artist bring a laneway wall to life.

This program continues to ignite passion for all students who have a love for a challenge, design and technology. Students in the Junior School participate as a part of a Lego Robotics team and collaborate on projects, guided by specialist teachers.




FROM THE ARCHIVES

FIFTY YEARS AGO...

As we were unable to have our Golden Girls Day this year, I would like to remember especially those girls who graduated in 1970, and what a year it was!

We had about 500 students enrolled and quite a small staff at the time.

Enrolments had gradually increased in both the Junior and Senior schools and there was now quite a waiting list for boarders.

With plans underway for new boarding accommodation, Iona was staffed with a good mix of Presentation Sisters and lay teachers, about 30 in all. The Principal, Sister Carmel Ryan and the Head Girl, Julie Howlett.

Two Iona Past Pupils made their First Profession at Iona in January 1970: Sr Anthony (Mary) Mackin and Sr Anne (Frances) Hayes.

In July of 1970, Mother General Albeus Fahey and Sr M Carmel Ryan travelled to Rome and were honoured with a private audience (a "Bacio-Mano") with His Holiness, Pope Paul VI.

1970 was the last year Iona girls sat for the Junior Examination (Year 10 or 3rd Year, as it was known then). Academic results were extremely pleasing with the Iona overall average pass rate of 86% far exceeding the overall state average of 73%! Nursing and Teaching Bursaries and six Commonwealth Secondary Scholarships were won. Leaving results were also excellent

with a pass rate of 100%. 21 girls sat the Leaving Examinations, eight students were awarded University or Tertiary Education Scholarships and the Dux of the College was Anne Lee.

Iona also performed well in other fields such as Music, Drama and Debating, winning a number of awards. The seniors were again awarded the shield for choral speech, making it the fifth win over the previous six years. Kerry Kirby was the winner of the junior section of the Speaker of the Year Competition- a fifth straight win for Iona! And Freida Popen attained the distinction of an A.Mus.A in piano, a really fantastic achievement at the age of 17.

"It's Academic" was filmed at Channel 7 studios and Iona achieved second place to St Louis.

The annual May Day Procession was held in honour of Our Lady, and Susan Fitzgerald was chosen to crown Our Lady's statue in the Convent grounds.

Sport continued to be an important part of school life here at Iona in 1970, with the Athletics Team placing second to St Gertrude's (New Norcia) in the Interschool competition. They would have to wait until 1971, to finally win the competition! In the house competitions, St Anne's were victorious at both the Swimming and Athletics carnivals.

The Legion of Mary and Young Christian Students continued to draw strong student support.

The main dramatic production for the year was Justice (adapted from The Merchant of Venice). Sister Clement won the Producer's Award. Linda Skrolys (née Shylock) won Best Supporting Actress Award and Agnes O'Neill (née Portia) received an Honourable Mention.

The Mikado was presented at Speech Night with about 50 girls ranging from first to fifth year taking part.



As was tradition, the year ended with Speech Night. This end of year celebration has continued annually since December 1908, the first year the college enrolled pupils (2 February). The guest speaker for the 1970 Speech Night was Monsignor John Murphy.

Class of 1970, we look forward to inaugurating you as Golden Girls next year!
