# My happiness, my meaning

After graduating from Iona in 2012, I took my time deciding what I wanted to do and didn't jump straight into university. I wasn't a high academic achiever and I had some tough times in high school, so instead I jumped from job to job and experience to experience. I travelled through Southeast Asia for three months and then onto Europe; any place I could explore, I went.

When I turned 20, I thought it was time to focus on building a career. I attended Notre Dame University to study Nursing but after a year, decided it wasn't for me. I spent the next two years working at a café in Fremantle, as well as coaching after school sports at Iona. I was very grateful to be given that opportunity because it led me to choose the type of work I do now.


In 2018, I started a Bachelor of Youth Work at Edith Cowan University. I was hooked after my first lecture and felt like I'd finally found my purpose. The following year I received the opportunity of a lifetime to complete my year-long practical placement in England. This was an amazing experience, working at a drop-in youth centre in a low socio-economic area with young people who had experienced all sorts of trauma and disadvantages.

When I returned to Australia, I finished my degree, graduating at the end of 2020. At first, I balanced working at a couple of youth services whilst still coaching soccer at Iona. I took pride in my job as a coach, and it gave me the confidence I needed in my job. In high school I felt I would never find that 'thing' that I was meant to do, but with time and support I did.

Now I have found a job that fits. I am a Youth Housing Worker at Youth Place in Fremantle. Youth Place is run by St Patrick's Community Service (St Pat's), a well-known homelessness service and community housing provider in the south metropolitan of Perth. I currently case manage around 20 young people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. My main goal is to find them long-term suitable housing. I also help with outreach support such as helping young people with their education, mental health and finances.

The way I support young people today is partly because of what I have learnt and absorbed from the people who supported me. I think about some of the teachers and peers I had at Iona and take different parts of their approach towards me and apply it into my practice in community work with young people.

# Nursing in the North

“It was a great privilege to be welcomed into these communities, to learn about their culture and country, to build strong bonds with many individuals and for the families to share their stories with us.”



Moving to Australia's north had always appealed to me since my days as an Iona Boarder, and after graduating from Nursing at Notre Dame in 2004, the idea became a reality.

I first nursed in small country towns in WA's Wheatbelt before moving to Derby. This was a great introduction to life above the Tropic of Capricorn - exciting, fun, hot and many nursing opportunities.

I then moved to the Northern Territory and took a role on the Orthopaedic Ward at Royal Darwin Hospital before moving into the area of Alcohol and Other Drugs. This work saw me spend the next eight years working within the urban region, as well as travelling to remote communities across the top end to help provide education on the harm and effects of substances, specifically volatile substance use.

I worked alongside Elders, families and other organisations, to provide support to clients, some of whom were in their teenage years. Our goal was to enable a break from substance use, allowing their bodies and minds to regain their health and become strong again.

It was a great privilege to be welcomed into these communities, to learn about their culture and country, to build strong bonds with many individuals and for the families to share their stories with us.

It was also a great comfort that my sisters, Vicky and Kathy, had moved to take up teaching roles both in Darwin and remote communities. Plus, I had one of my 'Iona sisters' at a community in East Arnhem Land. Jessica Bath *née Neesham* (Class of 1999) was teaching at a local school, and her husband was working for Clontarf supporting the young Aboriginal men. *Iona girls* (and their husbands) *make a difference*, certainly rings true here!

The North is such a unique and beautiful part of Australia, and I feel very fortunate to have experienced it so intimately. We would often travel by light aircraft to visit the communities, and I always wore my St Christopher medal as there were many hairy flights! You never knew if you would be dodging big dark storms on the way home to Darwin or diverting elsewhere to stay overnight.

Whilst I loved building such close bonds with the communities, the work was very challenging, and you would often question whether you were making a difference. Around this time, I was taking a break from the job to resume work at RDH. To my great surprise, I was given a very moving send-off from one of the communities. The Health workers gifted me some locally-designed shirts and thanked me for supporting and working alongside them.

I've recently made the move back to Perth to be closer to family, my new little niece and friends. I am enjoying this time settling into my new life back here with my boyfriend and dog Winnie, and getting back to see my parents on the farm in Lake Grace. But my time in the North has shaped me immensely and I am feeling the call to return to work to help provide care and support to others within our community.

# Creating a sense of belonging

The restaurant and catering business has always been a big part of my life.

I grew up in Kalgoorlie where my parents ran the Kalgoorlie Hotel. Famous for its pizzas and friendly atmosphere, it was a fun and vibrant childhood surrounded by family, and our adopted family - the hotel guests.

My mum was an Ionian, and so (perhaps reluctantly) I became an Iona Boarder for Years 11 and 12. I was soon swept up with making new friends - both day girls and boarders - enjoying the different activities the school and the Boarding House had to offer and taking friends back to Kalgoorlie on long weekends.

Not long after graduating from high school, my family moved to Perth where we opened our café, Pizzacas. Located on a back lane in Scarborough, our purpose for the past 15 years has been to create a friendly and relaxed dining experience that serves authentic Italian cuisine.

It is a family affair at the café. Whilst my dad has hung up his chef's hat, both my parents work tirelessly behind the scenes, my aunty bakes the cakes and sweet treats, and even my son works at the neighbouring pasta shop between his studies and football commitments.

While I was managing the café, I also began a grazing platter business, KaraKara. This was an exciting and challenging new venture as not only did

I have to learn the fundamentals of building my own business, but also how to grow the brand creatively. From weddings to baby showers, race meets to corporate events and birthdays - we did everything! What I loved most about the job was seeing people come together around one of our platters to celebrate a special occasion - that was a real privilege.

When COVID-19 hit, the landscape of the food industry changed rapidly. KaraKara took a hiatus while we focused on our core business. In those immediate few weeks, we had to respond quickly in order to adapt. We changed our website, included a delivery service for the first time, and expanded our pick-up repertoire. What was really important to us was staying connected to our customers who may have been feeling isolated at home and disorientated from all the change.

At our pasta shop, which is located two shops down from the café, we created a different family meal for every night of the week. We knew that it wasn't just businesses that were struggling but also families that needed a helping hand. The packages were generously portioned at affordable prices. We hoped that this would give our customers something to look forward to and a taste of normal life, particularly in those early lockdown periods.

We have a strong community spirit at the café. Many of our regulars come into the shop three or four times a week, sometimes even twice a day. So, we knew that with the COVID lockdowns this could affect their sense of belonging. When we came through the other side, we definitely felt a stronger bond with our regulars. People were calling up to book out tables, and there was a real sense of camaraderie. It had also been an education in the importance of supporting local. It

felt like because we'd supported our community, now they wanted to support us.

We are in the process of opening up a new venue on the same lane we started Pizzacas all those years ago. A crazy move during COVID times perhaps, but it's a testament to the tight community that we have built. In essence, we wanted to build something new for our regulars. For the past 15 years they have been supporting us, and now we want to give them something special in return. The new Pizzaca Pizzeria Bar will still have all the old favourites for our community to enjoy but in a fresh new setting with some extra pizzazz.

“Our customers are at the heart of what we do. We may not always know what is going on in their lives, but as I teach my staff, when someone comes in we need to make them feel welcomed, as we might just be the best part of their day.”



# Defined by Community

I have never known a time in my life that my family have not been involved as volunteers at the Melville Water Polo Club. My earliest recollections at the age of four centred on weekends and holidays assisting my father, his brothers and other club members to construct a purpose-built water polo pool at Bicton Baths. Endless hours of physical labour, fundraising, and time away from family was endured to achieve the greater goal of providing our community with a resource that could be enjoyed by all.

My grandparents instilled a strong sense of service in the community through their involvement and participation in both school and parish roles. Currently, there are over twenty immediate and extended Neesham family members who are actively involved at the Melville Water Polo Club on a volunteer basis, in various roles.

My involvement at Melville Water Polo Club began 12 years ago when my daughters started to play water polo. After a few years, I was asked to take on a volunteer role as Team Manager and, since that time, I have managed multiple junior girls' teams at all levels of competition; including many current and past Ionians. In 2017, I was approached to manage the Fremantle Water Polo Mariners, who play in the Australian Water Polo League. This role requires me to wear many hats, but the most important element of my role is the support and pastoral care of players.

I have been very fortunate in my life to have had a very special connection to Iona, which has helped me in my volunteer roles. I am a Past Pupil, my children are Past Pupils and I have been teaching in the Junior School since 2003.

During my time at Iona, Sister Maureen Moynihan has been the most influential person for me professionally and personally. Her gifts of empathy, active listening and sage advice are qualities that I strive to utilise in all aspects of my life. My personal experiences as a teacher and volunteer, and the Iona Presentation College core values of service and community, reinforce that, "Every person is defined by the community she belongs to." # Giving back to Community

After graduating from Iona, I completed my Bachelor of Commerce/Arts at UWA and worked in Human Resources. I loved working in this field but alas, I'd also fallen in love with a farmer and I packed up and moved to Cascade, about 110km north west of Esperance!

Initially it was difficult to adjust to the change of pace from corporate life. We're a long way from everywhere, often declining invitations to special events because we are working. The seeding and harvest seasons seem to stretch out longer every year and our income is too dependent on global markets and weather.

Despite this, we've always known how incredibly blessed we are to work within our own business and to raise our sons in this idyllic space. The community is really special, full of generous and intelligent people who are always willing to help one another. I've seen this so many times but especially after the devastating bush fires that swept through our area in 2015.

In 2020, a handful of like-minded farmers started working on the idea of a community foundation where farmers from the Esperance area could collectively contribute and give back to the wider community. We wanted to share some of our success with those who were facing challenging times and to invest in opportunities that will help Esperance to thrive, to make it a place anyone would want to live, work and play.

It has taken almost two years to establish the Esperance Ag Fund, but in May we announced our inaugural grant recipients. Through grain and cash donations from farmers we were able to gift \$70,900 towards local projects. It is a significant first step in our plan for the Esperance Ag Fund to make an ongoing investment in our community.

We formed as a named fund under the Fremantle Foundation. If you haven't heard of the Fremantle Foundation, I urge you to Google this amazing organisation because it is a good news story from our own backyard that we all need to hear.

My time at Iona nurtured my belief in service to the community. Mrs Joan Easton (former Head of Boarding) was a great mentor to me. We worked in Vision Generation together to raise money for our Indian sponsor child, Shoba, and ran the 40 Hour Famine each year. I always admired Mrs Easton's kind, yet no nonsense, outcomes-focused approach, and I think I've carried that with me ever since.

# Kidney Queen

This is not only my story, it is also a wonderful story of community.

It is true to say that I simply wouldn't be here today without the support of my family and friends, many of whom are fellow Ionians. It was in fact the 'gift of life' donated by a classmate many years ago, that has kept me alive and healthy and able to tell my story.

Let's rewind the clock a bit.

I was diagnosed with a rare form of kidney disease at nine months old. Despite it destroying 75% of my kidney function, I managed until I was 18 years old. Not long after graduation in 1992, I became dependent on the support of a dialysis machine for 12 hours a week. Needless to say, my final year at Iona was a struggle with end stage renal failure, however my teachers and dear friends remained unwavering in their love and support which was a great comfort.

It would be six years before I received a kidney transplant from my beautiful mother. 12 months later, I met the man of my dreams and we were soon married. We lived happily in Gracetown, Dunsborough and then Cowaramup. It was whilst on a 12-month road trip together, that I



contracted E.Coli - sadly, this would mark the demise of my kidney transplant.

Despite the efforts of both western and eastern medicine, we could not save my kidney, and after 13 years to the day, I was back on dialysis. My weight plummeted to 35kg and I had 10 litres of fluid on my lungs - I was in a very, very bad way.

I had always kept journals when I was younger and so, without the energy to take the concerned phone calls from family and friends, I started to write again. That is when, 'Kidneyqueen' was born - my saving grace.

I began a regular online blog which was shared far and wide, and which became nothing short of a miracle. It made it to my Class of 1992 Facebook page and into the hands of an angel.

Erin Coyne (also Class of 1992) and I weren't close at school but we had a mutual respect for one another. We went our separate ways after graduation, Erin becoming a mum of four and a nurse, and I moved to the South-West. It truly was miraculous that Erin read my blog.

Completely out of the blue, Erin made contact, explained her story, good fortune and health and that she would be honoured if I accepted her offer of donating her kidney.

The process we both went through was long and complicated, but after 12 months of testing, coping with the ups and downs of my fragile condition, Erin was able to donate her kidney to help save my life.

Although her kidney was not a match, we still went on to become part of a donor exchange program. Together, Erin and my husband both joined the national 'kidney lotto'. This national register is for people in a similar situation with a willing incompatible donor. In the end, Erin was a match to someone in Victoria, the Victorian donor was compatible to someone in Queensland, and their donor was compatible to me!

We celebrated eight years 'kidney strong' in February this year.

Erin and I have an incredibly strong connection going through this uniquely humbling experience together. We showed each other mutual respect as we clearly had the same values - to treat others as you would like to be treated, as everyone has a story and, for the most part, life is challenging for everyone.

Erin too faced a tragedy that no mother should ever bare in April 2021. I could not take her pain away in the same way she did for me, but it was a great comfort to just be there for her.

After a life of trauma, I was diagnosed with PTSD in 2017 and for years did not recognise myself. After making some life changes, relocating from our beautiful home in Cowaramup, starting a journey of mindfulness practice, accepting therapy and changing career, I began to once again, see 'me'.

I also realised, the true meaning of life, that money and 'things' really mean nothing.

I gave up my senior role, began working at Vinnies and studying a Certificate III in Community Services at TAFE. Coordinating volunteers and working in the welfare department made me feel like I had truly found my purpose.

Not once, but twice, I had won the ultimate lotto. The prize of life! As humbling as this experience was, I struggled to live a normal life and wanted so much to 'give back'. I tried to do too much, too soon, which at times was undervalued. So, I retreated, reset, slowed down, learnt to adjust to my new life and what I could now do with a healthy body.

My life is now dedicated to developing a greater understanding of grief and bereavement support. My husband and I are downsizing to have more time to spend together, exploring our backyard with our two beautiful kelpies.

At age 47, I hope to keep learning new skills and exploring the opportunities this life has to offer. Life has been incredibly difficult at times but also so kind. I plan to continue to be brave, be bold, and be kind, and always remember that we, as a community, are all in this together.

# Mentoring 2022

**The IPPA Mentoring Program for 2022 was launched this year on the grounds of The University of Western Australia.**



# Bionic Arms

**Throughout Term 2, students in Year Six have been completing a Biomedical Technology STEM project. The project aims to develop 21st century skills including, but not limited to, critical thinking, collaboration, creativity, communication, coding and learning autonomy.**

Following the Engineering Design Process, students worked in small groups to design, construct, test and operate a bionic or prosthetic limb.

The project will culminate in a prototype showcase, with the aim that each prototype is dexterous, providing movement which mimics typical functionality of the chosen body part.

The first three lessons of the project were full of experiential learning opportunities. Students have had a chance to further develop their STEM skills with a newspaper tower building challenge, and constructing and testing a model of the human hand, all whilst learning about anatomical structures.



# Happy Campers

First up was our Year 6 students who attended Forest Edge Recreation Camp in Waroona. The theme for the three days was 'Expand Your Paradigm'. This Semester, our Year 11 Visual Arts ATAR students have been studying a unit on the theme of 'Identity', with the first few weeks focussing on exploring a wide range of mediums, for example; graphite, charcoal, ballpoint pen and oil pastels on upcycled backgrounds. The students were given source images of various woman, the identity of whom are only known to the teacher.

The girls, whilst experimenting with their drawing techniques, were encouraged to try to establish and get creative about who their subject may in fact be, and to consider how they will portray her 'identity' in a final artwork.
